Dear Beloved Community,

This Lenten season, we have been thinking about how things grow—planting and pruning, good soil and conditions for growth, nurturing and tending, planting and harvest. Specifically, we have been talking about how things take root and using that as a metaphor for what it means for us to be rooted in Christ.

Marge Piercy writes:

Under a sky the color of pea soup she is looking at her work growing away there actively, thickly like grape-vines or pole beans as things grow in the real world, slowly enough. If you tend them properly, if you mulch, if you water, if you provide birds that eat insects a home and winter food, if the sun shines and you pick off caterpillars, if the praying mantis comes and the ladybugs and the bees, then the plants flourish, but at their own internal clock.

I've been thinking about how the work we do as a church is coming along, "as things grow in the real world, slowly enough." Sometimes it seems like things have moved slowly regarding our Building Expansion Project. In my first year here, we began conversation about a capital campaign to address some delayed maintenance at the church. In 2014, we had cottage meetings in homes to talk about our future. In 2016, the whole church took a survey about where we should go. All of this was cultivation of ideas, dreams, hopes for our future. This led to our broad goals of being *Grounded in Gratitude, Spiritually Alive, Beloved Community, and Christ's Hands*.

Recently, I was invited to meet with our UCC Barnstable Committee on Ministry for a periodic support conversation. I brought several items to share – the visioning work that we did in *Walking in the Way of Jesus*: our Spiritual Blueprint and Strategic Plan, our Covenant for Working Together, our Open and Affirming/Reconciling Covenant of Welcome, and an update about our Capital Campaign. Together, we have done important work of discernment and definition of what kind of church we feel called to be. The Committee was impressed with the work that we have been doing as a congregation and commented what a joy it was to hear from a healthy, vital church.

This month, we enter into a public phase of our Capital Campaign to raise funds for our vision: a larger hall where people can gather for fellowship and recovery work, where art can be displayed and where people can rummage for much-needed items, classrooms for our children that are sunlit and handicap accessible, offices for our staff that are adequate for their work, and expanded sanctuary seating and a widening of the altar to give us more space to worship and room to welcome others. This is an important stage in completing our vision—gathering the resources that it will take to make this dream a reality. Our generosity will literally prepare the ground for what will be. Our goal to be Grounded in Gratitude which revolved around caring for our facility and responding to God with our resources and talents is taking root.

Piercy's poem ends, "Every gardener knows that after the digging, after the planting, after the long season of tending and growth, the harvest comes."

Our Season of Lent and Holy Week

Ash Wednesday: February 26

Members and friends joined together in Bruce Hall for a soup supper that was hosted by the Deacons. Afterwards, everyone was invited to an Ash Wednesday worship service and Imposition of Ashes. The ashes of Ash Wednesday are a powerful biblical symbol of both repentance and grace. It is this dimension of movement from the past to the future, the movement from failure to second chances, the movement from the old to the new, that marks the beginning of the journey through Lent toward Easter.

Sundays: March 1, 8, 15, 22, and 29 at 10am

We invite you to go deeper into the season of Lent, and to help you do so, we have two devotionals available for you: "Love Builds Up," designed for families, and "Wendell Berry and the Sabbath Poetry of Lent." Both were designed by The Salt Project. Both devotionals are free, and they are in the Bruce Hall window. Electronic copies can be emailed to you if you cannot make it to church or you'd like to share them with family and friends elsewhere. May our Lenten season lead us more deeply into the heart of God. Our worship theme will be "Rooted in Christ," and we look forward to planting ourselves into the gospel texts this season.

Palm Sunday: April 5, 10am

Palm Sunday is also known as Passion Sunday. This is the day when Jesus, accompanied by his disciples, entered the city of Jerusalem in triumph. An enthusiastic crowd greeted Jesus by spreading palm branches along the road and shouting *Hosanna*, a Hebrew expression meaning "save us." The throng hailed Jesus as the "Son of David," the Messiah promised by God. Our Sunday worship will include waving our own palms, as we enter this week together. (Please note—there is no Sunday School on Palm Sunday.)

Maundy Thursday: April 9, 6:30pm

Maundy Thursday recalls the events that took place the night Jesus was betrayed. The gospels concentrate on the institution of the Lord's Supper and Jesus' final meal with his disciples. The word "maundy" is derived from the Latin phrase *mandatum novum*, meaning "new commandment." It refers to the Lord's words to His apostles, as recorded in John 13:34: "A new command I give you: love one another."

Maundy Thursday will be celebrated with dinner church. Sharing a meal is a tradition from the earliest days of the church. In the second and third centuries, Christians gathered for sacred meals they called Eucharist (a Greek word that means "thanksgiving"). Jesus and many of his first followers were Jewish, so the meals were related to Jewish Sabbath supper and Seder meals and involved blessing bread and a cup. The meals shared by these early Christians were the great-great grandparent of our modern Eucharist, also called Communion or The Lord's Supper.

Good Friday Watch: April 10, 12noon-3pm

Good Friday is the solemn remembrance of Jesus' death on the cross. The English designation of "Good Friday" is apparently a corruption of "God's Friday," although the term has now been accepted as "Good" because God triumphs in Jesus' resurrection. Good Friday worship is marked by austerity and silence. The Cotuit Federated Church sanctuary will be open between 12noon and 3pm for personal meditation and reflection.

Easter Sunday: April 12 Sunrise Service, Loop Beach, 5:45am Traditional Community Breakfast in Bruce Hall, 7am Festival Worship in the Sanctuary, 10am Easter Coffee and Refreshments in Bruce Hall, 11:15am

Easter Sunday begins at sunrise on Loop Beach, located on Ocean View Avenue in Cotuit. Please come to Cotuit Federated Church's community room, Bruce Hall, following the sunrise service for a traditional community breakfast.

The Easter festival service begins at 10am in the sanctuary. Age-appropriate teaching for children is available in the lower level Church School classrooms. A fully-staffed nursery is offered for infants and toddlers at any time before or during the service, as needed. Everyone is invited to Bruce Hall for Easter coffee and refreshments following this service.

CHAIR YOGA AND MEDITATION

Chair Yoga is a wonderful movement practice for helping to maintain flexibility and strength in our body, mind and soul as we age. Each class begins and ends with a centering meditation. We explore different breathwork practices, do movements to warm up our shoulders, hips and spines and then do many yoga poses and sequences, both seated and standing, using the chair for support. This is a full practice! And, did I mention that we have fun? We value the healing power of humor as we breathe, bend and stretch. 
ADMIN TEAM REPORT

The Admin team has continued to meet monthly to review and support the daily operations of the church. We review the church's operating budget, and we recently met with KSP, our financial advisers, to review the CFC portfolio. Thanks to John Murray and Charlie Dings for their assistance and guidance during this process. Admin continues to work on maintaining the church properties, including repairs at the church, parsonage and the post office. One of the biggest repairs that we are working on is the church alarm system. We have started the process of renegotiating the post office lease and will continue to work on that with the assistance of an outside consultant to get the best deal for our future needs. I would like to express my thanks to all the members of the Admin Team for their dedication and effort to help make CFC a better place.

DEACONS' REPORT

In December, Dr. Roger Klingler, a physician with extensive experience in caring for the aging and \rightarrow



those with incurable illnesses, spoke to the Deacons. His visit was to enlist the congregation's support for an upcoming state bill to cover medical aid in dying. The purpose of the bill would be to prevent unnecessary suffering, provide peace of mind that unbearable pain is not inevitable, assure people they can have the death they want, and encourage the use of hospice. The Deacons will schedule Dr. Klingler to address the congregation during Coffee Hour in the near future. Congratulations were extended to Deacon Beth Crouch on her assignment as Battalion Commander at Joint Base Cape Cod with responsibility for 70 airmen and ten or so contractors. This follows her two-year stint at the Pentagon as a General's Aide. With people like Beth in charge, it would appear that our Air Force is in good hands! Communion in the pews was held once again in February with generally satisfactory results. There were a few awkward moments, however, which leave room for improvement in the future. The Deacons plan to do communion in the pews twice a year, in February and August. On Ash Wednesday, the Deacons hosted a soup supper prior to the evening service, as has been traditional. On February 24, several Deacons attended a seminar sponsored by the Barnstable Police Department entitled, "Protecting Your House of Worship." Based on what we learned, we will be reviewing our current status. We are also trying to get a police spokesperson to come to CFC to address the congregation on the same subject during Coffee Hour sometime in the near future. In the works: changes to name tags and communion dishware. Be on the lookout for them!

Lots of learning is happening in the Church School! The winter curriculum has focused on the Gospel of Matthew. The spring curriculum includes stories of Lent and Easter from the Gospels of Matthew and John.

CFC Response to the Coronavirus

Dear Beloved Community,

Our Deacons and Leadership Teams are closely monitoring the situation with the Coronavirus (CoVid 19). As of the printing of this newsletter, we are still having public worship but encourage those who are older or have compromised immune systems to consider options for worshiping at home, like following our HomeTouch mailing or online resources in the *Weekly Word* email.

We urge everyone to follow this guidance:

- * Stay home if you are feeling sick.
- * Wash your hands frequently and for at least 20 seconds.
- * Use hand sanitizer—this is a second choice to 20-second handwashing with soapy water.
- * Avoid touching your face.
- * Disinfect surfaces used regularly.
- * Avoid close contact with someone who is sick.
- * Avoid handshaking. In place, put your hands over your heart and offer a warm greeting.
- * Practice these precautionary measures at home and pass this information along to family and friends.

Our Deacons have decided that we will follow the lead of the public schools and local officials. If we are told to cancel in-person worship or if the schools close, we will move to an online format. Please watch your email for instructions and information about decisions from in-person to online worship.

For the first time in 60 years, we, as a congregation, face a moment to fortify and enrich our church, and prepare for its long and vital future.

Over the past six months, the Building Expansion Team and other church leaders have met with several members of our church and select members of our broader community to raise the funds necessary to expand our sanctuary, construct a new community building, and complete necessary renovations to our existing building.
