

Passover Remembered Poem by Alla Bozarth

Pack Nothing. Bring only your determination to serve and your willingness to be free.

Don't wait for the bread to rise. Take nourishment for the journey, but eat standing, be ready to move at a moment's notice.

Do not hesitate to leave your old ways behind—fear, silence, submission.

Only surrender to the need of the time— to love justice and walk humbly with your God.

Do not take time to explain to the neighbors. Tell only a few trusted friends and family members.

Then begin quickly, before you have time to sink back into the old slavery.

Set out in the dark.
I will send fire to warm and encourage you.
I will be with you in the fire
and I will be with you in the cloud.
You will learn to eat new food
and find refuge in new places.
I will give you dreams in the desert
to guide you safely home to that place
you have not yet seen.

Dear Beloved Community,

The book of Exodus contains stories that have been foundational for generations of readers who were seeking freedom. Harriet Tubman hailed as a Moses as she led others out of bondage. The spirituals written during slavery and sung during the Civil Rights era in our country are full of references to the Exodus narrative. Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King in his final sermon preached "I've Been to the Mountain Top", he concludes with seeing the Promised Land from afar. This is what scripture can do. It can root us in our history as God's people. It can bring us hope and courage to follow in God's way. It can teach us to rely day by day on God's providence that comes like manna from heaven – just enough, not to be stockpiled – sufficient for each day alone.

Alla Renée Bozarth wrote one of my favorite pieces of poetry based on the Exodus story. You can read it on the side over the next few pages of the Chimes. It was written for the 25th anniversary of the Philadelphia Eleven, the first eleven women ordained as priests in the Episcopal Church in 1974. It has been another twenty-five years, and we have just passed over the 50th anniversary. Bozarth's poem reads with deeper meaning and more layers in this period of our history. This is how our lived experience and scripture can intertwine, bringing deeper meaning to both our reading of the holy texts and the living of our days.

This fall, we will spend time with Moses and Aaron and Miriam.

The stories you tell one another around your fires in the dark will make you strong and wise.

Outsiders will attack you, and some who follow you, and at times you will weary and turn on each other from fear and fatigue and blind forgetfulness.

You have been preparing for this for hundreds of

I am sending you into the wilderness to make a way and to learn my ways more deeply.

Those who fight you will teach you. Those who fear you will strengthen you. Those who follow you may forget you. Only be faithful. This alone matters.

Some of you will die in the desert, for the way is longer than anyone imagined. Some of you will give birth.

Some will join other tribes along the way, and some will simply stop and create new families in a welcoming oasis.

Some of you will be so changed by weathers and wanderings that even your closest friends will have to learn your features as though for the first time. Some of you will not change at all.

Some will be abandoned by your dearest loves and misunderstood by those who have known you since birth and feel abandoned by you.

Some will find new friendship in unlikely faces, and old friends as faithful and true as the pillar of God's flame.

Wear protection. Your flesh will be torn as you make a path with your bodies through sharp tangles. Wear protection.

Others who follow may deride or forget the fools who first bled where thorns once were, carrying them away in their own flesh.

Such urgency as you now bear may embarrass your children who will know little of these times.

Sing songs as you go, and hold close together. You may at times grow confused and lose your way.









Continue to call each other by the names I've given you, to help remember who you are. You will get where you are going by remembering who you are.

Touch each other and keep telling the stories of old bondage and of how I delivered you.

Tell you children lest they forget and fall into danger— remind them even they were not born in freedom but under a bondage they no longer remember, which is still with them, if unseen.

Or they were born in the open desert where no signposts are.

Make maps as you go, remembering the way back from before you were born.

So long ago you fell into slavery, slipped into it unawares, out of hunger and need.

You left your famished country for freedom and food in a new land, but you fell unconscious and passive, and slavery overtook you as you fell asleep in the ease of your life.

You no longer told stories of home to remember who you were.

Do not let your children sleep through the journey's hardship. Keep them awake and walking on their own feet so that you both remain strong and on course.

So you will be only the first of many waves of deliverance on these desert seas.

It is the first of many beginnings—your Paschaltide. Remain true to this mystery.

Pass on the whole story. I spared you all by calling you forth from your chains.

Do not go back. I am with you now and I am waiting for you.











We will explore what is required to break free of the ruling of the Pharaohs of this world. We will wade in the waters that cross over into liberation. We will think about the days and years of wandering in the wilderness, and how sometime even bondage feels more comfortable than leaning into a radical trust in God that frees us from all that binds us.

Join us as we find hope in this text that has rooted so many peoples and movement, as we too wake up each morning with our minds stayed on freedom.



Can We Talk Conversation with Rev. Liz Walker Sunday, September 21 at 11:30 a.m. in Hamilton Hall



Join us as we eagerly welcome Rev. Liz Walker as our guest preacher for our morning worship service on Sunday, September 21. During the service, we will also celebrate Rev. Dan's installation as our Associate Pastor and Community Minister. After church, we will host Rev. Walker and several special guests for a presentation about her new book, titled "No One Left Alone: A Story of How Community Helps Us Heal," which is also our fall read. Signed books will be available for purchase after the service. In addition to being a dear friend of Dan and Nancy, Rev. Walker is the retired pastor of Roxbury Presbyterian Church, an ordained minister in the African Methodist Episcopal tradition, and a veteran television journalist. Notably, she was the first African-American weeknight news anchor for WBZ Boston. Currently, she serves as the Executive Director of the Social Impact Center and the "Can We Talk" network. With over 20 local and national "Can We Talk" chapters (and counting), Rev. Walker has been expanding her Roxbury-based model of transformative, trauma-informed care. This model creates sacred spaces for individuals and communities to share their stories of trauma, loss, grief, and hope. We are thrilled that Rev. Walker will lead us in breaking open God's holy word and launching our own series of Can We Talks Justice Forums (see below)!

"Road to Freedom" Civil Right Pilgrimage to Selma and Montgomery March 2026

Interested in exploring the Equal Justice Initiative's powerful Legacy Museum and National Memorial for Peace and Justice, marching across the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma, and visiting about other historic Civil Rights sites like the ACLU museum, the Dexter Avenue Baptist Church and Martin Luther King Jr's parsonage? 








Small Group Book Study for the Fall

The Pivotal Moments in the Old Testament Series helps readers see Scripture with new eyes, highlighting short, key texts—"pivotal moments"—that shift our expectations and invite us to turn toward another reality transformed by God's purposes and action.

The book of Exodus brims with dramatic stories familiar to most of us: the burning bush, Moses' ringing proclamation to Pharaoh to "Let my people go," the parting of the Red Sea. These signs of God's liberating agency have sustained oppressed people seeking deliverance over the ages. But Exodus is also a complex book. Reading the text firsthand, one encounters multilayered narratives: about entrenched socioeconomic systems that exploit the vulnerable, the mysterious action of the divine, and the giving of a new law meant to set the people of Israel apart. How does a contemporary reader make sense of it all? And what does Exodus have to say about our own systems of domination and economic excess?

In Delivered out of Empire, Walter Brueggemann offers a guide to the first half of Exodus, drawing out "pivotal moments" in the text to help readers untangle it. Throughout, Brueggemann shows how Exodus consistently reveals a God in radical solidarity with the powerless.


